The Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire
A centennial commemoration in words
and music, co-sponsored by NCJW-SF
Sunday, March 27th, 1-3 pm at the Bureau of Jewish
Education Jewish Community Library,
1835 Ellis Street, San Francisco

On March 25, 1911, a fire broke out on the eighth floor of the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory in Lower Manhattan. One hundred and forty-six garment workers, mostly young female Jewish immigrants, were killed either by the blaze or from jumping out of windows, because managers had locked the stairwell doors and exits to keep workers from leaving early. The tragedy led to legislation requiring improved factory safety standards and helped to strengthen the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union (ILGWU), which has fought for better and safer working conditions for sweatshop workers. NCJW was instrumental in advocating for the changes that followed this devastating event.

In this program commemorating the fire's centennial, Judy Baston will explore the Jewish responses to the tragedy, Professor Elaine Leeder will discuss the dramatic life of Rose Pesotta and the influence of other Jewish women, such as Rose Schneiderman, in the labor movement, and Jill Tallmer will lead the audience in Yiddish labor songs of the era, including Dos Lid Funem Trayengl-Fayer (Ballad of the Triangle Fire) and Arbeter-Froyen (Working Women).
